## North District Open Water Team at French Cup Final

Last weekend (23<sup>rd</sup>-24<sup>th</sup> September) saw the Noth District open Water team competing in the final of the French Open Water Cup at Lissac-sur-Couze in the south of France. The team of seven were selected on the basis of results in the Scottish Open Water season and all competed in the 5 km and 10 km events against most of France's top swimmers in the discipline.

The 5 km on Saturday was raced over four circuits of a 1.25 km course and saw Ben McLaughlin finish first among the squad in the men's race with 10<sup>th</sup> place overall within the field of 73 starters. He was followed home by Fraser Tetlow (17<sup>th</sup>), Oscar Chirnside (22<sup>nd</sup>) and Fergus Reid (39<sup>th</sup>). Ben's position gave him 4<sup>th</sup> place in the 16-17 year category with Fraser 9<sup>th</sup>. Oscar and Fergus were 2<sup>nd</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> respectively in the 14-15 year category.



The women's race provided further successes with Kelly McIntosh finishing 13<sup>th</sup> overall just ahead of Emily Riach in 14<sup>th</sup> out of the 64 starters. For Kelly this meant 1<sup>st</sup> place in the masters (25 and over) category and Emily gaining 3<sup>rd</sup> place in the 20-24 category. Isla Reid was the third member of the team coming home in 41<sup>st</sup> place overall and 14<sup>th</sup> in the 16-17 year category.

The first day was completed by the 4 x 500 metre relay in which the team of Ben McLaughlin, Fraser Tetlow, Kelly McIntosh and Emily Riach started with high hopes. The team took an early and convincing lead over the other 10 teams which they held until the finish. Top position on the podium not only meant gold medals but distinctive straw hats and €200 in prize money.

The second day featured the Olympic distance of 10 km with all swimmers taking part. The water temperature was just above the level where wetsuits are no longer permitted making it the first time that many of the team had attempted the distance without one. Four of the team were forced to retire at various stages but three swam well to the finish line. Ben McLaughlin had a particularly strong eighth and final circuit overtaking 5 swimmers to earn 6<sup>th</sup> place overall from 40 starters and first in the 16-17 category. This made up for missing out on being available at the Scottish Swimming awards dinner the previous evening to collect his award as the top senior open water swimmer.

Emily Riach also finished strongly to get 7<sup>th</sup> place of the 41 starters and 2<sup>nd</sup> place in the 20 years and over category. Isla Reid also had a good race finishing in 24<sup>th</sup> overall and 12<sup>th</sup> within the 16-17 year category.

Commenting on the trip, team coach Richard McLaughlin said "This was a fantastic experience for our team as it gave them the opportunity to race in a highquality field with larger entry levels than they are used to back home. The number of swimmers in the group starts was a real challenge to our guys who are used to racing in a small pack. The scale also allowed them to practice their racing skills for example drafting and dealing with breakaway groups. We even had to cope with a bright sun dazzling the swimmers and making sighting difficult, something they have yet to experience back home! Although the water temperature cost some of our swimmers in the 10K the overall response from the team was that they thoroughly enjoyed the experienced and learned lots of new skills."

The event brought an end to the swimmers open water season for 2023. They will concentrate on pool events for the next 8 months before returning to the lochs of Scotland in June 2024 having benefited from their international experience.
